Getting to know...Dave Kemptner

The school building was a grass hut. The floors were "bare earth," covered with cow manure that was used to discourage insects and keep dust down. Looking up, the ceiling was slats of bamboo. The beds or cots were strips of cowhide woven together. This is the school where my neighbor Dave Kemptner spent the first nine years of his life in the early 1930s in Aba Africa (now Zaire) in the Belgian Congo The following account can only slightly describe what has been an interesting and full life.

Dave was born the youngest of four children to missionary parents. He and his siblings were born in a grass hut. Dave chuckled when I asked if there was indoor plumbing. I took that chuckle to be a "no." His father taught the natives how to drain a swamp and use the water to irrigate fruits and vegetables. He was such a good gardener that Aba was one of the only places that had fruits and vegetables. Dave's mother taught him how to read. There were 10 children in the mission school.

Life was primitive and exciting. Mail took six months or more to come and go. Christmas packages had to be mailed in the summer. There were no paved roads. Travel was done on a pontoon boat pulled across rivers with no bridges or by oxcart or a motorcycle with a sidecar. Because he was the youngest, Dave

would scoot to the front of the sidecar where there were a couple of air holes and that's where he would ride. (I'm guessing that car insurance wouldn't cover that in today's world.) There were pythons and monkeys and lots of birds. As a treat for his mother, the natives prepared a special meal. Part of that meal was a cooked monkey with its hand extended towards her. She politely declined the primate. It was special though. Another time, Dave's cousin was in bed one night and a leopard jumped right over her. The only thing ever to jump in my room was my brother trying to bug me.

When Dave was nine his family moved back to the States. But you didn't just jump onto a plane and fly home. It took about a month. They took a freighter from Mombassa to Tokyo. China and Japan were at war so when three Chinese fighter planes flew overhead, tensions were high on the freighter. Once in Tokyo there was a layover and sightseeing of a Buddhist Temple. The floors were squeaky and later Dave found out the squeaky floors were the burglar alarm for the Temple. The next leg of the trip was on a more luxurious ship but Dave's family, being of humble means, was accommodated below deck. A brass bar told them they could go no higher. The family lived in San Francisco and Los Angeles for a short period of time.

Greenbelt Guardians Report



Our Greenbelt Guardians group went dormant during this summer's scorching heat and record drought. We're very grateful that we did our summer work day before the summer furnace was turned up. The greenbelt vegetation has suffered, with severe wilting and notable die backs of young Red Oak trees.

Good news - the resurfacing of the Homedale entry trail with polymer granite was completed early in the summer. Through our Stones grant funds we provided the materials for the work, and John Cook used some Environmental Corps volunteers to regrade the trail, and spread and pack the materials. These recent 5" rain episodes put the new swales and berms and canting of the path to the test, and it passed with flying colors - no more runnels and troughs etched down the center of the trail. It is also attractive now, since the trees planted alongside the trail several years ago are growing tall, providing a shaded corridor.

We are still following up on the policy for police presence on the greenbelt, since we no longer have Parks Police who specialize in surveillance of this area. There are two reports of police use of a four wheeler vehicle to respond to calls for help. These are noisy vehicles that are designed for on-road use, and there is evidence of damage to the earthen trail near 360. We have asked Council Member Martinez's aide to inquire about police policy using these vehicles on the greenbelt.

We are planning two work days this fall, to play catch-up in our

invasives removal work. The policy announced by the Balcones Canyonlands Preserve manager, of allowing invasives removal only during the months when the endangered birds are absent, is still in effect. We will be addressing ways to respond to this conundrum with a new local weed working group being organized under the auspices of the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center. Hopefully we can come up with something effective, to avoid the irony of losing the integrity of the habitat that is meant to be preserved for these endangered birds. We are decades behind the invasives...

Our next quarterly work day will be Saturday, October 31, from 9:00 - 1:00 at Homedale Trail. We

hope to have lots of neighbors and other greenbelt fans show up to clear out ligustrum and nandina, extend the rock steps down a steep portion of the trail, do a major weeding of our trail entry area, cut up some large fallen limbs on a steep hillside and organize them to be useful in erosion control, and clean up trash along the switchback trail and the rock flats area. We will have some Halloween fun, so wear something to express the holiday spirit.

On Saturday, November 21, from 9:00 - noon, a group of our team leaders will guide the work of some Rotary Service group volunteers. We anticipate having 10-20 volunteers working with us on that day. Our major focus will be invasives.

Time to Refinance?

Mortgage rates continue to hover around historic lows of 5%, largely due to support from the Federal Reserve, which will *not* last forever.

Then finally they settled in Denver. Africa to Colorado is a whole world of change. Dave wasn't too happy about it but adapted. He graduated from high school and visited a church in nearby

Englewood, where he met his wife Helen who played the organ. The church had a basketball and softball team that would let him play so he stayed. Helen said, "He was the cutest thing I ever saw." On November 5th they will be married 58 years. They have four children and six grandchildren. The love they have for each other and their family is obvious and inspiring.


Dave was in the Air Force and fully expected to be sent to Korea. He was sent to Albuquerque instead as a member of the 4925th Atomic Test Group. If a plane was going to be used to drop an atomic bomb then it went to Albuquerque first for testing. Once discharged from the army, Helen and Dave moved back to Denver, "never to leave again." They stayed two years.

They moved to Houston with two other families and started a company that made tuning forks for the oil business that was later bought out by Tracor, so the Kemptners moved to Austin.

They bought a lot in NW Hills when it was completely undeveloped. They were not sure they would stay in Austin. After all, they'd just built a new house in Houston for their four children to live in until college. But as fate would have it, jobs worked out, the parade of homes in Barton Hills was happening and their real estate agent was willing to trade them the lot in NW Hills for the house where they now live on Briargrove Dr.

Forty-five years ago Barton Hills Dr. ended about where the Market is. All that was there was a gravel pit. There was no bridge on Barton Hills Dr. They remember their kids skiing on Briargrove one year when Austin had a great snowstorm. After living in Denver this must have been pretty funny. So much has changed since they first moved here. The only sad part of this story is that they will be moving soon to be closer to their daughters and grandchildren. I just hope they come back and visit. They sure will be missed.
