AISD FACILITY MASTER PLANNING

The Barton Hills neighborhood almost lost its beloved elementary school 5 years ago. An Austin Independent School District (AISD) facility process proposed closure and consolidation options which threatened the future of public education in our hood. Fortunately, district leaders listened to the community input (i.e. outcry) from the across the city and took different approaches to address the challenges they were facing. Well, once again, the elected officials – our Board of Trustees – want to listen, so they have commissioned a group of community members from across the city to help them develop a long-range facility master plan. This time, though, we are wiser and much more engaged...and instead of waiting to hear the results, we have representation right in the thick of things.

Last October, I was asked by District 5 Trustee, Amber Elenz, to be a part of the **FABPAC** – cool name, huh? It is the acronym you will hear that stands for the Facility and Bond Planning Advisory Committee. As tri-chair, I help lead and plan our meetings and processes to assure that in addition to the expertise of district staff and external consultants, we bring forward the unique perspectives –and needs- of Austin. For example, areas in the northwest and southwest of the city are bursting at the seams with students. They desperately need us to look at how to expand facilities that aren't safely meeting their needs – let alone allowing children to learn in the most modern ways. Other schools have lost many students due to higher rents, rising property taxes and the competition of charter schools. And, as we know in Central Austin, our schools may be full, but they are aging and some face the threat of future population

declines. In the meantime, the district continues to win awards and gain recognition for it academic programming - and new exciting programs are in the works. Our committee is faced with addressing all of those facility challenges...and later, funding issues...associated with reinventing the urban school experience for Austin's school children.

Greeting Neighbors!

It is funny how summer starts off like a broad open expanse, the prospect that the upcoming three months are going to last forever and all the opportunities you have to go out and do things are endless... then all of a sudden it is the end of August and you are scratching your head wondering where all the time went. I know that is most definitely the way I feel and likely the same for all the families out there with kids and for those who like to travel. Judging by what I have heard from city officials, both in the police and the parks department, I have to believe things will be different next time the creek is flowing. We will still have to share the natural resources that define our neighborhood, but with our continued input and involvement we can return our greenbelt and creek back to the relaxing, peaceful place it has always been.



The **FABPAC** meets at least monthly at various district facilities. We've been to the oldest and newest schools, as well as the largest, smallest and most innovative ones. Our task is to make recommendations to the Trustees for a long-range master plan. In the short-term, we are also analyzing immediate needs to prepare a potential May 2017 bond election. I want to keep you informed along the way, as we all know our taxes are pretty high in the BH 'hood. We need to make sure we trust the decisions and that we will get the most from those tax investments. It will be critical to stay informed of the impacts specifically on Barton Hills elementary, O. Henry Middle, Austin High, the magnet programs and all the schools across the city.

I am very excited to be part of a process that will allow for active community engagement throughout the planning (not primarily at the end of it, like in 2011!) and hope you can join in the fun. UPDATE: BARTON HILLS COMMUNITY PARK

Construction Updates:

Slope between playground and slab: There are 53 limestone blocks strategically placed on the slope that were not there two months ago. There is grass on the slope surrounding those limestone blocks that was not there two months ago. There is a sprinkler system on the slope to water the grass that surrounds those limestone blocks that wasn't there two months ago. The first phase of revamping this slope is almost complete. Praise needs to be given to neighbor Melissa Hawthorne who wrote and got the grant and coordinated the project, neighbor Stefan Pharis who completed the drawings and Strata Landscape who did the work. Thanks are to be given to the Austin Park Foundation and Austin City Limits for providing the funds and approving the grant, and finally, Austin Parks and Rec. for approving the project.

Comprehensive Plan for the Park: The Committee's next project is to consider a comprehensive plan to deal with a multitude of park master plan issues. A diagram of the plan of what could be done has been created by Stefan Pharis and his neighborhood landscape firm, Pharis Design. The issues to be dealt with are: (I) adding more limestone blocks to the slope, (2) moving the trail to increase the open area on the upper level, (3) improving the rain garden located in front of the rear entrance to the school, (4) redoing the drainage pipe which channels water under the track/trail at the northeast part of the park and (5) the purchase of new exercise equipment.

Sidewalks for Homedale & Briarcrest adjacent to school & park: The Barton Hills PTA and Parks Committee have long sought to have sidewalks installed adjacent to the school and park along Homedale and Briarcrest. Our City councilwoman, Ann Kitchen, heard the request and listed the sidewalks as a project to be done with the extra funds that were generated and not used on the ill-fated extension of light rail. You have probably noticed that the project has begun, as about half of the sidewalks have been poured. Estimated completion date is mid-September due to all the rain.

CRIME STATISTICS

Due to the numerous problems and complaints this past spring and summer the police intend to increase patrols of the greenbelt trailheads. At the July neighborhood meeting the APD representatives stressed that calling 911 and reporting any problem seen as a non-emergency will get a quicker response than calling 311.

The police representatives also told us about the **Austin 311 app**: whenever you see something that needs to be brought to the city's attention (graffiti, a loose dog, loud music, potholes, etc.), you use the app to take a photo and (if location services are enabled) the app will geolocate your photo to give a precise location to 311 so they can dispatch the appropriate responder. This will be especially helpful down in the greenbelt where it's difficult to describe one's position to police dispatch.


TRAFFIC CALMING: Concrete Planters

The west-side of the street bike lanes will be barricaded from the driving lanes for most of the street by turtle humps, not those white sticks as along Bluebonnet. However, through the generous work from some BH neighbors & friends (shout out to our Councilmember Ann Kitchen, Austin Transportation's Mike Schofield, Melissa Hawthorne, Stefan Pharis, and others) and contractors working with us on the park improvements, we are going to get thirty 50-gallon-reservoir self-watering planters installed in 10 locations (i.e., 3 planters per location) mostly in front of the school. The strange cut-out concrete shapes you see there within a few weeks will house these planters, creating a beautiful bike lane/crosswalk barriers.

The plants slated to be installed have been donated by a very generous neighbor, and will have low-watering needs. But, of course, Low-Watering does not mean No-Watering. So this is a request for contributions of time and money. We have a couple of matching pledges already in the mix (\$2000, I think), so any donation neighbors can make would be great to help us meet those matching challenges and get double the donations.

Funds will be allocated in the BHNA budget specifically for installation, maintenance and watering costs for the plants. We also need Green-Thumb Volunteers, just for the occasional pruning and caring for the plantings. Once established the plants should do fine.
